Why join a Journal Club?

- Intellectually stimulating
- Expands your knowledge
- Makes work more interesting
- Very collegial
- Excellent practice at giving talks Make it fun!!

What are the barriers??

- Time involved
- Speaking in front of colleagues
- Nobody else has organised it

- Access to Journals
- Difficulty selecting appropriate articles

You can do it!

Nuts and Bolts

- Minimum of two people
- 20-30 minutes once a month
- A place to meet
- Access to journal articles
- A way to select what to review
- The will to do it

How to chose an article

- Decide where to look for articles
- Go for relevance : if it interests you it is likely to be interesting
- Something digestible: choose one you can handle

Ask for input from others

How to prepare a review

- 1. Skim read it: read the abstract, look for the "big picture"
- 2. Read it in detail: read the methods section carefully

study the results to understand the findings think about the points in the discussion research any parts you don't understand

- 3. Write a one-sentence summary overview of the article
- 4. Summarise key points from each section:
 - Context
 - Materials and Methods
 - Results
 - Discussion

5. Write a one-sentence summary of the conclusion of the article

How to present a review

Decide how long you have to talk: don't go over time

1. Clearly state the title, source and the authors

2. Deliver your one-sentence overview as your opening sentence: get the attention of your audience.

- 3. Present the key points : Aims, Methods, Results and Discussion
- 4. End with a one-sentence summary/conclusion

5. Give your own response to the article: what excites you? what did you learn? what do you agree/don't agree with?

6. Allow time for group discussion if this is appropriate
