

NCPTS 2016 TRAINING INITIATIVES



The VRPCC WORKBOOK 2nd Edition

Over the past two years, the VRPCC Workbook has been fully revised and updated to incorporate the move to 100% Liquid-based Cytology and HPV testing, as currently used in New Zealand. Thanks to all those associated with this large project, particularly Abed Kader (co-author), Liz Pringle, Paul Spek and Andrew Miller (peer reviewers). The revised Workbook and accompanying Logbook are now available for future VRPCC candidates. The Workbook will be distributed in 2017 to pathology registrars (via data sticks) and to new registrars commencing training in pathology in future years.

CYTOSCIENTISTS and CYTOTECHNICIANS

The three topics selected for cytoscientists/cytotechnicians for 2016 were Crowded sheets, AIS and ASC-US vs reactive samples. These were the topics for all workshops and for the circulated teaching sets of glass slides.

Australian Cytoscientist-led Workshops. Annette O'Leary, a senior cytoscientist from Adelaide ran three workshops at SurePath laboratories in April. The workshops were again well received. In additional to the 2016 topics selected, Annette provided an update about the Renewal of the Australian NCSP and lead a session looking an some challenging unknown cases. We are grateful for the continued willingness of our Australian colleagues to come to New Zealand to provide a fresh perspective on cytology morphology.

New Zealand Cytoscientist-led Workshops. Three workshops were held in three ThinPrep laboratories during November. Tamaki Inoue (LabPlus) presented a workshop at APS, Christl Kirstein (APS) visited Medlab Central and Christina Holdaway (Medlab Central) presented at LabPlus.

Two teaching sets of glass slides were circulated to each cytology laboratory, using ThinPrep or SurePath slides as appropriate for the laboratory site. The sets were compiled by Christl Kirstein (Two ThinPrep sets), Abed Kader (one SurePath set) and Ashika Bissoon (one SurePath set).

MOLECULAR SCIENTISTS

The 2016 annual newsletter for molecular scientists will be circulated in December, providing an update on developments relating to HPV testing for primary screening. A Forum Board on the NCPTS website will be available in 2017 for molecular scientists performing HPV testing. This will provide a place where comments or questions about HPV testing can be posted, to facilitate communication between molecular scientists. Further information will be distributed to molecular scientists in the December 2016 Molecular Scientists' newsletter.

PATHOLOGISTS and ANATOMICAL PATHOLOGY REGISTRARS

The anatomic pathology registrar annual weekend workshops were held in Auckland and Christchurch in October again this year. Thanks to Dr Diane Kenwright for providing teaching in cervical histopathology, Drs Andrew Miller (SurePath) and Margaret Lovell-Smith (ThinPrep) for cytology multiheader sessions and Dr Ai-Ling Tan (Auckland) for presenting a session on managing women with cervical cancer.

Six teaching slide sets (three ThinPrep and three SurePath) were distributed to all Anatomic Pathology registrars during the year.

Support for registrars sitting the RCPA examination in Cytology was provided by way of mock examination slide tests which candidates completed in the weeks prior to the RCPA examination. Additional cytology teaching slide sets were also sent to Wellington Registrars.

The NCPTS half-day workshop at the **NZIMLS ASM** in Rotorua in August included three conference reports from the 19th International Congress of Cytology held in Yokohama (May/June 2016). Two speakers (*Mary Webster* and *Tamaki Inoue*) attended the Congress as recipients of NCPTS International Scholarships. Other talks included a cytology quiz of four unknown ThinPrep cases (Presenter: *Muna Bulbal*), a presentation about the UK Artistic Trial relating to the use of HPV testing for primary screening (*Margaret Sage*) and an update from the NCSP about the workforce implications of moving to HPV testing for primary screening in New Zealand (*Deborah Mills*).

The theme of the NCPTS contribution to the **RCPA-NZ Annual Scientific Meeting** in Napier in September was The Pathology of HPV-related disease. Dr Bryan Knight from the Victorian Cytology Service spoke about plans to move to HPV primary screening in Australia and discussed several difficult histopathology cases with practical diagnostic teaching points. Rebecca Lucas-Roxburgh then outlined the research she is currently undertaking at Massey University on HPV-associated Oropharyngeal cancer in New Zealand. Jane O'Hallahan (Clinical Director, NSU) concluded the session with an update about the HPV primary screening project in New Zealand.

TRAINING INITIATIVES: PLANS for 2017

Implications for the workforce of the move to primary screening with HPV testing in 2018 were discussed at length at the annual meeting of the National Training Committee in November 2016. A review of the structure and function of the NCPTS was also undertaken, after 5 years of operation. Outcomes of the discussion include plans to run a national training day focusing on topics such as the use of HPV testing for primary screening, HPV test methodologies and immunization. This will be organised by the NCPTS with invitations to all laboratory staff who provide reporting services to the NCSP. Further details including the date and venue will be announced early in 2017.

Other programmes that will continue as usual in 2017 will be the Australian cytoscientist—led workshops for cytoscientists/cytotechnicians (ThinPrep labs), the NZ cytoscientist-led workshops (SurePath labs), AP registrar workshops, and slide rotation sets for registrars and cytoscientists/cytotechnicians. Plans for a contribution to the RCPA -NZ ASM in Rotorua is also underway. In-house training for various sector groups are also being planned.
